They are made by taking a block of ice and running a sharp blade over the ice to shave off flakes. These flakes are gathered into a cone and packed together. After the ice is packed, you pour flavoring over the ice. In the mall we saw two restaurants next to each other called Vera's Kitchen and Betty's Kitchen. This is the name of Angie's mom and grandmother, a pretty funny coincidence. We returned the rental car and went to the airport. The airport was incredibly hot. While waiting for the plane, we got a root beer at the airport. One of the worst I ever had. I guess airport food just isn't real food after all. Off we flew to Maui.

The flight took about 25 minutes. When we arrived in Maui, it was a little warm and humid. We got our rental car and drove to the hotel. The hotel was on the west coast of Maui and the airport was on the east coast. It took about 30 minutes to drive to the hotel. The drive was really nice. The average speed is twenty miles per hour. The whole purpose of taking the road to Hana is to drive ten miles past the city. There is a National Park where the Seven Sacred Pools are located.
